# 2.0 GENERAL OVERVIEW.

The committee on Cooperative Management, Tourism and Wildlife held a committee meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> February 2021. It was noted that there were many Cooperative Societies in the County, some were operational and others dormant. It was evident that funds were being allocated to the section of Cooperatives, Tourism and Wildlife and much was being underutilized.

It was in light of the above the committee resolved to invite the CEC In charge of Trade, Industrialization, Cooperatives, Tourism and Wildlife to attend a consultative meeting with the committee on 25<sup>th</sup> February 2021 and was required to submit the following information ;

1. List of all existing Co-operative societies in the County

- 2. The status of the said Co-operative societies (Dormant, Operational and newly registered)
- 3. Challenges facing the Cooperative Societies and their achievements.
- 4. The status of projects undertaken by the Department

# 2.1 LIST OF ALL EXISTING CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETIES IN THE COUNTY

There are a total of three Hundred and eight (308) Registered Cooperative Societies in the County; two hundred and two (202) are operational while one Hundred and Six (106) are dormant.

# 2.2 CHALLENGES FACING THE COOPERATIVE SOCIETIES AND THEIR ACHIEVEMENTS.

# 2.2.1 Challenges Facing Cooperative Societies

i) Governance Issues – Most of the active societies belong to the farmers. Their leaders lack management skills since they are not experts.

**ii) Weak capital base-** contributions and Commissions from the produce cannot sustain the cooperative societies.

**iii**) **Attitudinal Issues-**the ability of a cooperative to meet its members' expectations depends on whether management effectively evaluates membership needs. Most Cooperative officials' belief that the interests must be similar to their own and therefore there is no need to investigate them separately.

iv) **Financial Management-** The officials managing the cooperative societies tend to have financial crisis since they lack financial management skills, innovations and creativity for purposes of expansion of their societies hence need for capacity building.

**v**) **Political Interference**- when there is good political will among the leadership, the societies will always thrive and vice versa when there is no good political will.

**vi) Budgetary allocations** – The department receives many requests from different cooperative societies for support, but the allocation to the section is very minimal since the department has many sections.i.e Trade, Industrialization, Cooperatives, Wildlife and Tourism.

# 2.2.2 Achievements of cooperative Societies

i) The Co-operatives have enabled the members of the cooperatives to market their produce e.g. Coffee, Milk, Sugar cane and tea.

ii) The Saccos have mobilized savings to the tune of Ksh.15 Billion

iii) The Cooperatives have put up modern buildings in Kericho town e.g. Sinendet plaza, Kenya Highlands Sacco

iv) Some cooperatives are now involved in value addition of their produce, i.e. Kabianga Dairies

v) The Housing cooperatives have enabled their members get involved in real estate business.

### 4.0 Committee Observation

1. The constructed coffee bag store at Kamachungwa Farmers' Cooperative in Kipkelion was well constructed and already in use.

- 2. The road leading to Kamachungwa Farmer's Cooperative Society is in pathetic condition.
- 3. The constructed resting shed at Fortenan museum is in-complete.
- 4. There are no signboards erected along the road leading to the museums, tourists could easily miss direction leading to the site.
- 5. The office block constructed at Kapkatet Farmers' Cooperative society was well constructed, but not in use since it has not been furnished.
- 6. The Tourist attraction site at Reresik caves in Ainamoi is not demarcated despite having been allocated funds.
- The Constructed subsidized fertilizer store at Ainamoi Farmers' Cooperative Society is complete.
- 8. The milk cooling plant house at Seretut farmer's cooperative society is complete.
- 9. There are a total of three Hundred and eight (308) Registered Cooperative Societies in the County; two hundred and two (202) are active while one Hundred and Six (106) are dormant.

### **5.0 Committee Recommendations**

The committee made the following recommendations;

1. That the department of Trade, industrialization, cooperative management tourism and wildlife must ensure that all pending projects are completed and be operationalized.

- 2. That the department of Trade, Industrialization, Cooperative Management Tourism and Wildlife must ensure that funds allocated to projects should be utilized appropriately and efficiently for the intended purpose to ensure value for money.
- 3. The County Government through the department of Lands, Housing and Physical Planning fast-track the acquisition and demarcation of community lands for the purposes of tourism development i.e. Reresik, Chebulu and Tulwap etc.
- 4. The County Government through the department of Roads, Transport and Public Works should construct accessible roads to the projects and erect signboards for ease of direction for people visiting the projects.
- The Department of Trade, Industrialization, Cooperative Management Tourism and Wildlife to prioritize reviving after assessing the viability of cooperative societies which are dormant.
- 6. Cooperative Societies should be independent devoid of any political interference.
- 7. Budgetary allocations to the Section of Cooperatives Management, Tourism and Wildlife should be enhanced during budgeting, more so because it deals with the farmers directly in marketing their produce, in addition improvement and development of tourists sites that attracts tourists' hence increasing revenue in the County.
- 8. The County Government through the department of Trade, Tourism and Wildlife should ensure that Cooperative Societies' Leaders/Officials be trained on Semi-Annual basis on matters of Governance and Financial management to equip them on managerial skills for effective and efficient management of societies.
